Feedback from the local community :

"A Parkrun needs to be manned by a certain amount of people to act as Marshalls every Saturday, come rain or shine. It is a weekly commitment."

"The town should firstly invest in the buildings on the main road, they really look bad. Secondly, can the local businesses not try to create more wheelchair friendly access? Another thing is that tourists coming into town want information, which buildings to visit, interesting local places to go to etc."

"I want to start some kind of event, but things in town are always so poorly attended.

I really don't want to waste my time or money. There are no guarantees here."

"The Happy Hookers project worked so well, maybe that's the way to do it. As a cooperative business. Get 5 people together, start a clothing store and everyone works and contributes equally. Less pressure and many benefits. Buy from local seamstresses and start a real community clothing business."

"Remember that like many small rural towns, Uniondale is basically full of retirees that are happy with the way things are, or they wouldn't have moved here. You can come in and try to change things but it can be a challenge to change the status quo. Good luck in trying though, there is always room for improvement."

PLANT PROBLEMS, NATURAL NUISANCES AND GARDENING GAFFES HANDLED




The Sceletium tortuosum plant, commonly called kanna, is a succulent, blooming ground cover used for mass coverage in areas where other plants often fail. Growing kanna plants hold the moisture necessary to live through the driest of summers. However, an Internet search indicates the plant is not used primarily as an ornamental.


According to some info, kanna is used medicinally in its native Cape Provinces of South Africa as a mood elevator and anti-depressant. South Africans chew the plant, which is also said to aid in weight loss and to quell the addictions of smoking and alcoholism. Some have called it the "happy plant." Hello! This plant is also used in teas and tinctures and is sometimes even smoked along with other herbs. Unfortunately, the kanna plant is not often grown in cultivation, and information about kanna plants says it is dying out in the wild. One source encourages growers to attempt growing kanna plants so they can be saved from extinction. Kanna plant care is exacting when plants are young, though becomes minimal as the plants mature. Information about kanna plants indicates it is a low-growing shrub related to the ice plant. Attractive flowers vary in color from white to yellow and occasionally pale orange or pink. Blooms of the Sceletium tortuosum plant are spiky and appear similar to blooms of the spider mum.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH



Roosterkoek (literally grill cake – say "roor-stir-cook" and try to roll those r's!) is the traditional bread to accompany a braai or BBQ. The roosterkoek are simply balls of bread dough cooked on a grid over the coals, and are best eaten piping hot and straight off the grill. There are other traditional braai breads (e.g. potbread), but they require a cast iron three-legged pot with a flat base, whereas all you need for roosterkoek is some dough and a fire!

For those of you who want to perfect your roosterkoek skills, it may also be helpful to bear in mind the following hints and tips:

Make sure the dough is on the stiff side (reduce the liquid if necessary). If it is too runny, the dough is going to drip through the grid before the rolls have a chance to bake!

Get your braai grid as clean as possible if you are going to make roosterkoek – blackened reminders of the Ghosts of Braais Past clinging to your roosterkoek is not pretty or clever.

To stop the rolls from sticking to the grid, lightly oil your grid. Also make sure the rolls are shaped on a floured board so that they have a little flour clinging to the outside.

Be very careful with the fire you plan to cook these on. It should be neither too large (i.e flames licking the rolls!), nor too hot (black outside + runny inside = "No thanks, not really hungry today!"). Use the hand-over-the-coals endurance test – if you can hold your hand there for 10 seconds or more, you are probably OK. Also make sure that the coals are distributed as evenly as possible before putting the roosterkoek on the grid.

ROOSTERKOEK

INGREDIENTS: 300 g plain flour
10 ml instant yeast
5 ml salt
15 ml sugar
30 ml sunflower oil
180-200 ml warm water

DIRECTIONS: Mix the yeast and sugar together in a small cup together with a little of the warm water and stir. The mixture should foam after a minute or two. In a separate bowl, mix together the flour and salt, then add the oil and water while mixing continuously.

When the mixture comes together to form a dough, add the yeast and sugar and mix well.

Turn the dough out onto a lightly floured surface and knead for a few minutes. Place the kneaded dough in a lightly greased plastic bag or in a lightly greased bowl covered with a damp tea towel and allow to rise for about an hour, or until it has doubled in volume. Divide the dough into 12 roughly equal pieces and shape into slightly flattened balls on a floured surface. Place on a baking sheet and cover with clingfilm. Leave to rise for another 15 minutes.


Place the braai grid over evenly distributed direct coals and allow to heat for 5 minutes. Lightly grease the grid and place the rolls directly on it for about 15-20 minutes. Alternatively, place the baking sheet in an oven at about 180C/350F for 15-20 minutes. When half the cooking time has elapsed, turn the roosterkoek over. The roosterkoek are done when they are lightly browned, crispy on the outside and sound hollow when tapped. Remove from the fire/oven, split open and serve hot with butter.

Admire the town's historic architecture




